# The evolution of content required refocusing our collection

## The Evolution of the Book

The book as we know it today had to undergo quite a few changes over time before it became as convenient, affordable and accessible as it is today. Evolving over thousands of years from clay tablets, to scrolls, to bound manuscripts, the book has eventually become what it is today. Books continue to expand their reach with the onset of technology, and now e-books and audiobooks are readily available for the modern reader as well as the more traditional page-turning format. Follow this timeline to trace the fascinating evolution of the book.

# The statutory function of our collection

## **Wis. Stats. 43.05 General duties of the division**

**(11) Maintain a reference and loan library to supplement the collections of all types of libraries in this state by providing specialized materials not appropriately held and information sources not provided by local libraries or readily available from other area or state-level resource providers.**

The library shall provide specialized information services to state agency libraries and state employees, institution libraries, public library systems, public libraries, school libraries and other types of libraries according to policies developed by the division. Library and information services may include development of collections of specialized materials, interlibrary loan services, reference services, provision of database search services and maintenance of a statewide database of library materials. The library may contract with state agencies and libraries to provide library material cataloging and processing services.

# Our perception of the collection

- Physical items at 2109 South Stoughton = “the collection”
- Online resources including BadgerLink = “BadgerLink”
- Selection of physical objects has been made by an internal committee including reference librarians, interlibrary loan staff and the librarian supervisor
- BadgerLink databases are selected through an RFP process involving statewide input
- Found in Wisconsin, Wisconsin Digital Archive and the BadgerLink songbook database were developed independent of the print acquisition process

# The statutes don't recognize that division

- **Wis. Stats. 43.05**
- “Library and information services may include development of collections of specialized materials, interlibrary loan services, reference services, provision of database search services and maintenance of a statewide database of library materials.”

# We allowed our legacy to guide our thinking

- Because:
  - It was easy to continue the two separate workflows and staffing pattern
  - It was hard and painful to reexamine the collection and the staff supporting it
  - We still had **SOME** money to buy materials
  - Weeding was going to be **A LOT** of work and hadn't been done in **30 years**

## We made baby steps....

- Started by creating a Word version of the 1993 Collection Development Policy
- Took a year to revise it, and published the new policy in 2008
- Examined our circulation stats to uncover patterns of use

# 2008 Revision of the Collection Development Policy

- *Designed to set the stage for a de-emphasis on physical objects and a focus on online sources.*
- This revised policy seeks to acknowledge and address the financial constraints...
- A variety of current conditions necessitate a more focused approach to acquisitions.
- They include:
  - Rising cost of print sources
  - Higher relative cost of online sources,
  - Proliferation of online tools now available for direct home access by patrons
  - Reference and Loan acquisition budget is now smaller than most, if not all, public library system resource libraries.
- This policy acknowledges and address patron's increasing preference and demand for the wide array of new media formats and electronic content delivery options now available.

# 2008 Policy on the role of online tools

- The Reference and Loan Library supports a variety of online tools and services that address patron's desire for direct-from-home access to information.
- They include:
  - BadgerLink research and information databases
  - BadgerLink Songbook Database
  - AskAway virtual reference service
  - State Document Digital Archive
- This revision of the Collection Development Policy seeks to address the appropriate balance between online, multi-media and print content held locally, regionally and statewide.

# In 2008 we thought our strengths were

- **Music** (*instrumental instruction and popular songbooks and sheet music*)
- **Agriculture** (*crops and plants; livestock and pets, farm operation*)
- **Vehicle, tractor, boat and personal watercraft repair, maintenance and restoration**
- **Fine Arts and Collectibles** (*identifying artists/producers and valuing items*)
- **Library science** (*materials of use to public and school libraries*)
- **Education** (*history of education in Wisconsin, information literacy, special education, diversity*)
- **Commerce, business and finance**
- **Natural resources, environment, ecology and climate change** (*related to public health and the current and future economic viability of Wisconsin*)

# Our 2008-era collection



# By 2010 we knew we had to go further

- The need for an on-site physical reference collection has diminished dramatically
- Our collection budget had been further reduced from \$30,000 to \$15,000 - it is now dwarfed by that of most medium and large libraries
- Our budget made it impossible for the physical collection to meet its statutory role
- We were rethinking the use of our space
- Our new assistant state superintendent, Kurt Kiefer, encouraged us to reexamine everything

## We made some important discoveries

- Circulation has hovered in the 6000 to 7000 range for the past 5 to 10 years
- A October 2010 review of circulation statistics showed that **88%** of the collection had NOT circulated in the past 5 years
- BadgerLink and other online sources we build and manage do a better job of fulfilling the statutory role of our collection

# The contrast with BadgerLink is striking

- 10 different vendors offering:
  - Current general news and magazines
  - Business information and market statistics
  - Historical news, census data and genealogical information
  - Encyclopedias in English and Spanish
  - Curriculum support materials for all K-12 students
  - Content tailored to the educational community



# BadgerLink offers more and different content than the physical collection

- Educational videos
- Royalty-free music
- Test preparation materials for high school, college students and adults
- Curriculum support materials for literature and reading
- Collections focusing on health, science and history
- Auto repair information
- “Reader’s Advisory” content for K-12 and adults

# We developed a plan to reduce our physical collection

- Reviewed our Collection Development guidelines
- Studied our circulation statistics
- Analyzed the productivity of our collection: ratio of circulations to shelf space occupied
- Considered the current and future viability of various formats

# What did we retain in our core collection?

- Collections that have been the most productive
- Small collections in all formats to allow us to continue to borrow those formats on behalf of Wisconsin libraries
- Print collections on Native Americans and some Wisconsin history
- Documents produced by DPI
- Wisconsin Public Library annual reports

# We now focus on our truly core collections

- BadgerLink
- The Wisconsin Digital Archive
- Found in Wisconsin
- BadgerLink songbook
- A small physical collection

# How was the collection reduction managed?

- Collection reduction was performed according to the Department of Administration's Procurement Manual, guidelines for managing surplus state property
- They mandate that state property can be transferred to a municipality or another state agency, sold if detailed records are maintained and reported to DOA, recycled or disposed

# Serendipity stepped in

- We had been planning to repurpose some of our space to accommodate DPI staff and/or other organizations
- Early in our planning process Madison Public Library expressed interest
- Our space met their need to house the collection of the Central Library during their renovation
- We coordinated the reduction of our physical collection and their move
- Part of their collection and staff will be joining us on South Stoughton road later this fall

# Where did weeded items go?

- We began with about 188,000 titles including monographs, government documents, serials, periodicals, kits, CDs, DVDs, VHS tapes, laser disks, microforms, films and small collection of other formats
- 7,782 items were selected by publicly funded libraries statewide
- We worked with Surplus with a Purpose (SWAP) to determine what formats they would accept and felt they could sell and to arrange packing and transport

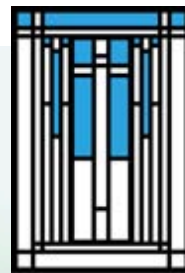
