THE MORMONS IN ILLINOIS

By Harry M. Beardsley*

There are today some three quarters of a million members of the two branches of the Mormon church. I hope none of them are in the audience because they will not like what I am going to say, and I would regret offending them. I have a sincere respect for all members of the faith I have met, and a real admiration for the fine social program the church carries out among its people.

J. B. S. Haldane, the British biologist, in a volume just published called *Science and Human Life* says: "Every generation must rewrite history. New facts become available and old facts are interpreted anew." Referring to the contributions science may make to history, Haldane cites the possibility that the researches of the Russian botanist Valivov into the genealogy of certain strains of cereals will determine definitely the part of the world in which grains and cattle were first domesticated, and when that information is available, we will have gone a long way toward tracing civilization to its source.

Nearer home the studies of Dr. Andrew Ellicott Douglas of the University of Arizona into the annual growth-rings of trees have enabled him to determine the exact dates that timbers used in construction of the prehistoric pueblos of the Southwest were cut from the living tree, and thereby to fix the date at which the pueblos were built.

In the same way, it seems to me, the psychological researches of Freud and his disciples—notably Jung and Adler—the researches of the various endocrinologists into the glands regulating human personality, open new avenues down which we can view in new perspectives some of the great figures of the past. Back of every movement in history is the dominating figure of an individual or group of individuals; hence the more clearly we understand the workings of these minds, the more fully we will be able to understand the movement. When I began to investigate the story of the **Mormons** and Joseph Smith, their founder, I had

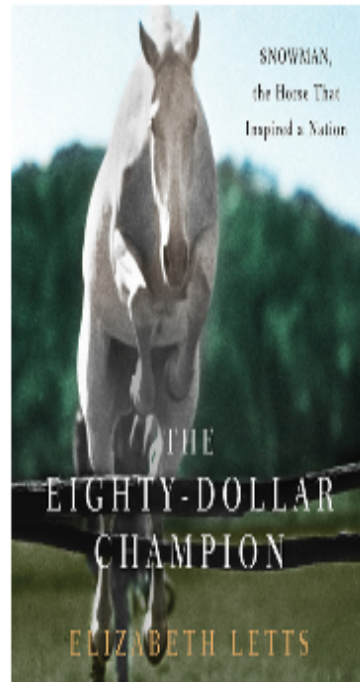
