




Minnesota Digital Library


Aligning Policy with Aspiration

- The DPLA hopes that the content and resources in the library will be put to creative uses that educate, inform, and empower current and future generations.
- The DPLA aims to make the cultural and scientific record available, free of charge, to all through databases of metadata. The DPLA, for this purpose, has undertaken the task of ingesting, indexing, enriching, and making available descriptive metadata and wishes to make such metadata widely available for reuse.
- The DPLA wishes to promote innovation in the development of applications and tools that use and rely on this metadata. In order to foster such innovation, the DPLA is committed to ensuring such metadata is unencumbered by legal restrictions.

Metadata Policy Statement

- The vast majority of metadata is not subject to copyright restrictions
- 2 DPLA's partners share the DPLA's vision of and commitment to freely sharable metadata to promote innovation.
- 3 DPLA asserts no rights over its database of metadata and dedicates its contributions to the public domain
- 4 DPLA's users are free to harvest, collect, modify, and/or otherwise use any metadata contained in the DPLA.


Process Overview

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Immigrant Narratives

The MDL proposes an initiative that gathers and digitizes extant oral histories from organizations across the state. These existing materials will be coupled with newly created or emerging stories that best document the rich tradition of immigration to this state.


A final web portal will weave together the audio, video, and images gathered into a single space where these stories will be gathered, saved, and shared in an openly and freely accessible manner.

Immigrant Narratives

MDL seeks to gather and share stories in three ways:

- Provide for the digitization and transcript creation for previously documented stories that may now exist only in analog format.
- Collaborate with local organizations with existing community relationships to visually/orally document the immigrant communities that make up our state.
- Work with partners -- Immigration History Research Center and the Center for Hmong Studies -- to capture these stories.





New Oral History Digitization

- Digitize existing analog oral histories.
- Incorporate stories already in digital format.
- Work with organizations to identify opportunities to share their oral history collections online.
- Allow for cross-searching of all materials.



Immigrant Stories



The purpose of **Immigrant Stories** is:

- partner with Minnesota's distinctive, yet understudied, immigrant and refugee communities to share their histories of migration and home in Minnesota through digital storytelling methods and technologies.
- create a publicly accessible digital archive of these stories and unique historical material.
- connect faculty, staff, and students to local communities of recent immigrants and refugees through outreach activities.
- train the next generation of undergraduate and graduate student researchers in digital storytelling, community-engaged research, and archive creation methodologies.

Immigrant Stories



This project will employ Concordia University Hmong students in conjunction with a local filmmaker to train, and equip Hmong students to **interview 10 historically significant Hmong figures in the community**.

The following permanent resources that will become a part of the Center for Hmong Studies collection and made available for discovery and access through the MDL and DPLA.

- Full-length digital copies of all 10 interviews conducted.
- Full text transcripts of all interview.
- Film to be created by the filmmakers from these 10 oral history interviews.
- All materials will be licensed in accordance with Creative Commons.
- Center for Hmong Studies will hold an on campus or near campus community event to showcase these stories and the participants and students who helped to make it possible.

Public Library Partnerships Project

The DPLA working with existing Service Hubs will provide digital skills training for public librarians and connect them sustainably with state and regional resources for digitizing, describing, and exhibiting their cultural heritage content.

Through the project, the DPLA and its Hub partners collaborate towards the achievement several key goals:

- Train public librarians in digital skills related to content selection, rights, scanning, digital preservation, metadata, writing for the web, and digital exhibition curation.
- Foster sustainable partnerships between Hubs and public libraries.
- Create new pathways through the Hubs for public library participation in DPLA
- Develop, implement, revise, and publicly share curricula for digital skills training as models for future use.
